2021 Sheriff's Office Annual Report As always, the Rabun County Sheriff's Office is proud to provide an annual report of our services and activities to the community. The Patrol Division, which is our most visible division, responded to a total of 8,684 calls dispatched through Rabun County 911. Sheriff's deputies completed 1,131 incident reports and 322 accident reports. The Georgia State Patrol investigated 50 accidents in Rabun County. Deputies issued 973 citations paired with 1,541 warnings. Deputies provided an array of services that include; 65 vehicle unlocks, 7,998 local business checks, escorted 119 funerals or other traffic details. Likewise, the deputies responded to 421 business/residential alarms county-wide. To protect and serve the community effectively and efficiently, our deputies proactively prevent crime by making themselves accessible, available and by patrolling 267,690 miles during 2021. Our school resource deputies completed 14 incident reports and 10 accident reports. School Resource Deputies also taught 130 classes on various safety topics to the students. These deputies participated in 234 security details, special events, administrative meetings, and conferences. They did all of these duties along with maintaining security of the entire school campus while school was in session or during the occurrence of extracurricular activities. Go Cats! As a result of the vigilant drug and dealer interdiction, deputies made 111 drug arrests during 2021. The K-9 Unit was deployed 66 times to assist in searching

for drugs and missing/wanted people. The Criminal Investigations' Division, opened 201 cases and reported successfully closing 145 cases during 2021. The Rabun County Detention Center processed a total of 832 people. A daily average population of 86 inmates were housed in the detention center. Our detention officers transported 376 inmates to court and 38 others to various mental health facilities across the state or even surrounding states when necessary. I, along with our Command Staff and our employees are extremely proud of the continued success and efforts of our goals towards reducing incarceration, increasing education and supporting rehabilitation. We have and will continue to offer powerful courses to inmates that are designed to equip them with skills and knowledge to be able to make better life choices upon their release. The Courthouse Security Division has maintained the security of the courthouse during business and after hours during 2021. These deputies along with the other offices in the courthouse have done a fantastic job in maintaining the safety of staff and citizens while keeping our courthouse open daily. The deputies provided security for 237 sessions of court and 25 Commissioners and/or Planning and Zoning meetings. The courthouse welcomed 31,084 visitors during 2021. In addition, 886 civil papers were served. The Training Division not only conducted in-house trainings, but also coordinated trainings with other agencies as well. Our deputies and detention staff received a total of 5,297 training hours during 2021. In keeping aligned with our mission statement of "empowering our members and the community to work in partnership to improve the quality of life within Rabun County," we conducted numerous events for the public. Our Citizen's Law Enforcement Academy was a success and is used to educate the public on the Office of the Sheriff here in Rabun County. Participants learn the history of the office and learn about each division within the Sheriff's Office. Our other popular educational and safety event, the citizens' firearms courses, were held several times throughout the year. Be on the lookout for information on attending both of these events in 2022. Developing partnerships both nationally and locally-led to our second Faith and Blue Weekend activities. The mission of this nationwide project is to create and build stronger bonds between law enforcement, the community, and the faith-based programs in communities. More than 100 families received food during this particular initiative. Another opportunity that the Sheriff's Office participated in was Operation Watchful Eye VI. This Georgia Sheriff's Association initiative focused on every Sheriff in the state checking in on all the registered sex offenders in their counties simultaneously. Our deputies worked tirelessly to verify the status of the 33 sex offenders living and/or working in Rabun County. We were also thrilled to partner with the Governor's Office of Highway Safety to host the Hands Across the Border Safety Check Event in Dillard. This event partners agencies from Georgia, North Carolina, South Carolina, and Tennessee to do high visibility enforcement events to promote highway safety initiatives. Sheriff Nichols also traveled to Macon to do the invocation for the GOHS Governor's Award Banquet. Our office also received a high visibility enforcement grant from the Governor's Office of Highway Safety to purchase needed radars, lidars, and a speed display trailer. This grant also pays for enforcement hours for deputies to utilize the equipment. The Rabun County Detention Center Captain Beth Darnell and her staff organized the second annual Christmas toy drive for the children of the facility's inmates. We partnered with Tabernacle Baptist Church again to carry out this program. The entire agency could get into the spirit of Christmas and provide some holiday cheer to children. The Rabun County Sheriff's Office submitted a grant proposal to the Criminal Justice Coordinating Council (CJCC) for V.A.W.A funding to develop and implement a Patrol Division DV Victim Unit. This is a three-year award and was just renewed for the second year. The Sheriff's Office also received American Recovery Funds from the CJCC that allowed us to expand our victims' services to include all victims, not just domestic violence victims. The CJCC and Governor Kemp also made grant monies available for law enforcement agencies to utilize in the area of Use of

Force. This grant awarded our office with approximately \$205,000 to purchase a scenario-based use of force simulator and upgrade our range with turning targets to do scenariobased training with live ammunition. This will enhance our deputy's decision-making in those tense and rapidly evolving use of force situations. The Sheriff's Office received a grant from the AAA Auto Club for safety equipment for the deputies. Also, through a partnership with our local health department renewed a grant that provides car seats to our community. In total, the Rabun County Sheriff's Office has received over \$400,000 for various positions, initiatives, and equipment. This past summer, we had our Second Annual Celebrity Golf Tournament benefitting the Georgia Sheriffs' Youth Homes (GSYH) at the Waterfall Club. Thanks to our participants, we raised \$20,000 for the GSYH We had a year filled with so many awards and positives. However, we also, unfortunately, had a loss that will never be replaced on September 1, 2021, Cpl. Courtney Zajdowicz was struck by a suspected drunk driver while on her way to work at the Rabun County Detention Center. Please keep her family, work family, and friends in your thoughts and prayers while we are all still adjusting to life without Kourtney. 

#### To Vote:

- 1. Use Black or Blue Ink to mark the ballot.
- 2. Completely fill in the empty oval to the left of the candidate name or choice in all races you wish to vote.
- 3. If voting for a Write-In candidate, completely fill in the oval to the left of the Write-In selection, then write the name of the Write-In candidate in the space provided.

#### Warning

- Do NOT use red ink or felt tip pen to mark ballot.
- Do NOT circle, underline or mark through choices.
- Do NOT use check marks or X to mark ballot.
- Do NOT mark more choices per race than allowed.
- Do NOT sign, cut, tear or damage the ballot.

#### If you make a mistake or change your mind on a selection:

A. Do not attempt to mark through the selection or attempt to erase. Write "Spoiled" across the ballot AND across the return envelope.

B. Mail or return the spoiled ballot and envelope to your county board of registrars; a new official absentee ballot will be mailed to you.

If you decide to vote in-person: Surrender the ballot to the poll manager at an early voting site within your county or the precinct to which you are assigned. You will then be permitted to vote a regular ballot.

"I understand that the offer or acceptance of money or any other object of value to vote for any particular candidate, list of candidates, issue, or list of issues included in this election constitutes an act of voter fraud and is a felony under Georgia law." (O.C.G.A. 21-2-284(e), 21-2-285(h) and 21-2-383(a))
